What should I do if I am taking valproate and not planning for pregnancy?

- You should still use effective contraception during valproate treatment to avoid unintended pregnancy; do not stop using the contraception until your doctor advises you to do so
- 2. Consult your doctor **AT ONCE** if you think you are pregnant
- 3. Do not stop taking valproate until you have discussed with your doctor and you are advised to do so

What should I do if I am taking valproate and planning for pregnancy?

- Consult your doctor first as soon as you have such plan
- 2. Do not stop using the contraception until your doctor advises you to do so
- 3. Do not stop taking valproate until you have discussed with your doctor and you are advised to do so



What should I do if I am taking valproate and I find myself pregnant?

- Contact your clinic AT ONCE and schedule an earliest appointment with your doctor if you think you are pregnant
- 2. Do not stop taking valproate until you have discussed with your doctor and you are advised to do so

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Use of Valproate - Contraception and Pregnancy

This applies to all female of childbearing age using valproate, who may get pregnant during treatment.

What are the risks of taking valproate during pregnancy?

- 1. If you take valproate when you are pregnant, it can cause serious harm to your unborn child:
 - The risks are higher with valproate than with other medications for epilepsy or bipolar disorder
 - The risks exist even with smaller doses of valproate the higher the dose, the higher the risk
- 2. Taking valproate whilst pregnant can harm your child in two ways:

(i) Birth defects

- In women in general population, 2 to 3 babies in every 100 will have a birth defect
- In women who take valproate while pregnant, around 10 babies in every 100 will have a birth defect
- Birth defects when the child is born include:
- Spina bifida where the bones of the spine do not develop properly
- Face and skull malformations including 'cleft lip' and 'cleft palate'. This is where the upper lip or bones in the face are split
- Malformations of the limbs, heart, kidney, urinary tract and sexual organs

(ii) Development and learning problems

- In women who take valproate while pregnant, 30–40 children in every 100 may have problems with development
- Problems with development and learning as the child grows up include:
- Delay in learning to walk and talk
- Intelligence lower than other children of the same age
- Poor speech and language skills
- Memory problems
- Children of mothers who take valproate in pregnancy are more likely to have autism or autism spectrum disorders
- The children may be more likely to have signs of Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)



What should I do if I am starting treatment with valproate?

- 1. Your doctor will explain to you why valproate is considered the right treatment choice for you and all the known possible risks of the treatment
- 2. If you are too young to become pregnant:
 - Since this could be a life-long treatment, it is important that you and your parents/caregivers know about these risks when valproate is taken during pregnancy. This is so you know what to do when you reach childbearing age and plan to have children
 - You or your parents/caregivers should contact the specialist once you experience menarche during valproate use
- 3. If you are already at childbearing age:
 - Always use effective contraception during treatment with valproate; do not stop using the contraception on your own
- 4. If you are planning for pregnancy:
 - Consult your doctor first as soon as you have such plan
 - Do not stop taking valproate until you have discussed with your doctor and you are advised to do so
